Review

- 1. Teachers have an impact, often unintended, on student career development.
- 2. Understanding career as being developmental, involving multiple roles, and guided by personal meaning within individual and social contexts provides a framework for supporting the career development of students.
- 3. Teachers can make their impact more intentional by attending to the 4 common career challenges youth face (literacy, context, gumption and integrity).

Meta-Analysis of 295 studies with > 30,000 clients:

- "[The] results confirm the robustness of the positive relation between the alliance and outcome."
- "This relation remains consistent across assessor perspectives, alliance and outcome measures, treatment approaches, patient characteristics, countries."

Subtext: Your depth of career knowledge is not nearly as important as the depth of your professional working alliance!


Short and long term improvements in:


- Student engagement;

It is no wonder that students turn to teachers before other school professionals for career help!













1. Professionals see their role impacting student career development by performing these functions:

Advising




Guiding Counselling (Guidance)

THRESHOLD



The professional educator incorporates career development knowledge into lessons and everyday conversations with students.



Over time, professional educators increase their "threshold" of comfort with incorporating career development knowledge into lessons and everyday conversations with students.

Core Implications for teachers:

With relatively modest levels of preparation, we can increase the awareness of the role teachers play as career influencers, and at the same time increase their comfort level - their threshold - for providing effective career interventions for students in any subject at any grade level.





Research Council of Canada

Making Influence Intentional and Positive Requires Knowledge of:

- How teachers can foster adaptability/survival skills (learning goals; Module 3.2);
- How teachers can support the learning goals (5 processes; Module 3.3), and
- How to have productive and positive career conversations (Module 3.4).



Summary:

- Teachers across all curricular and grade levels are natural career influencers
- The goal is to make the influence intentional, and thereby increase the potential for positive impact
- The most important foundation for change lies in the nature of the teacher-student working alliance
- Career helping can occur through formal or informal roles
- Think about how you can adjust your "role rheostat" to expand your circle of influence
